Dez

In early August 2016 I got a call from a long time CAVPT member, Sam Bevins. He told me that another long time CAVPT member, Curtis Sarkin, had found an eastern box turtle (EBT), Terrepene c. carolina, in his yard in downtown Rockport, more or less. The EBT is a Species of Special Concern in MA due to decreasing numbers in the state and they are less common in Rockport than many other locales. So....it's kind of a big deal.



I've lived in this area for 37 years and the only other EBT I know of from Cape Ann was also brought to my attention by Sam Bevins and his family, I'm guessing 7 years ago, from the Folly Cove area.

This one, a male, which we named Dez, is a handsome devil with a 5 3/4" carapace (top of shell) and approximately 35 years old according to my count of his growth rings (which is iffy as some of them are worn off), not shy at all. Wild ones often snap their hinged plastron (bottom of shell) shut and hide out while humans are around. This led us to speculate that Dez may have been an escaped pet...or maybe not. Hard to say for sure.

So I took Dez to my house and set up a makeshift turtle pen with a shallow water dish for drinking and soaking. He's an aggressive feeder and relished earthworms, strawberries and bananas. Then I called Tom French, Director of the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program, a Division of MA Fisheries & Wildlife, and he put

me in touch with Mike Jones, State Herpetologist. It was determined we should not release the turtle back in Curtis' yard as there are several busy roadways close by and it would not be surprising if Dez met his end under the wheels of someone's moving vehicle. A decision was made to release him in the South Woods

of Rockport and to track him by radio. We were able to get a small radio transmitter from Emilie Schuller, program coordinator

of Grassroots Wildlife Conservation, www.grassrootswildlife.org. On August 25th Antioch University grad Nik Gualco showed up

at my house and we glued the transmitter to the backside of the turtle's shell with epoxy putty, which is standard procedure. We released Dez that afternoon.

On December 7th I met Jessica Meck, Masters student at Antioch University studying Conservation Biology. She brought a radio receiver and in about 15 minutes we were able to track Dez to a location several hundred yards from where we released him. Jess makes the tracking look easy, which I know from experience, it isn't. Dez had found a small

depression in the forest floor about 6-8" deep and managed to cover himself with leaf litter. I can't remember the exact air temperature that day, but it was freaking cold and well below freezing. Dez was notably lethargic.

EBTs in northern climates actually freeze solid for 3-4 months in winter. Only a few vertebrates worldwide are able to pull this off, including the wood frog, Rana sylvatica, which is common on Cape Ann.

We hope to find Dez again in the spring, and if his transmitter battery holds a charge we may get a chance to track him for a while longer......

Certification Report

2016 was another productive year for vernal pond certification. We got some support from Herb Stillman who showed us a few new pools in Gloucester. We also did the field work for pools in Beverly and Rockport.

CAVPT board members Dave McKinnon and Erik Hinderlie help work through the backlog of collected vernal pool reports and register them online with the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP), Vernal Pool and Rare Species (VPRS) Information System. We are always looking for new volunteers interested in participating in the certification process. Turtle Trapping

We continued our efforts this year hoping to find the elusive Blanding's Turtle here on Cape Ann by trapping the large beaver pond on the Tomson Reservation, near an historical siting. We did find several snapping and painted turtles, but no Blanding's. It's a large wetland so we may check it again this year as there could be Blanding's in there that we haven't found. We will continue to search for rare species habitats.

A Note from Our Executive Director Rick Roth

Our vision for the future is to open a Wildlife Center on Cape Ann. This will not be restricted to vernal ponds - all kinds of New England habitat will be represented. The Center will also include the following:

- Live indoor and outdoor animal exhibits, professionally constructed with consideration for viewing experience, comfort, and the welfare of the animals. For example, in an otter enclosure one will view the animals underwater, on the water, in an upland habitat setting, and in a den
- On-site veterinarians
- Native wildlife rehabilitation
- Captive breeding and head-starting of rare species
- Native plants in greenhouses and outdoors
- Starting point for field trips to various habitats
- Destination for school, church, and camp field trips
- Educational programs on-site, with hosted speakers and trained wildlife instructors
- Gathering place to mobilize the local community and visitors to become stewards of our wild populations
- Home-base for our presentations and live animal exhibits at community events, schools, state parks, libraries, and private venues
- Green facility with solar panels, composting toilets, and powered by renewable resources

Rainy Nights and Flashlights

Every spring CAVPT members lead nighttime field trips to the ponds to see the amphibian-breeding activity. Check your flashlights, get new batteries, and put your rain gear on the hook by the door. To avoid habitat destruction and critter disturbance, we limit the number of participants on each trip. We also ask that you leave your dog at home. Interested? Email us at cavpt@yahoo.com.



The Need for Protection...

The temporary nature of vernal ponds often belies their importance. Countless plants and animals live in vernal ponds. Insects, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals visit to drink, feed, breed and nest. Some species, such as spotted salamanders, wood frogs and fairy shrimp are totally dependent on this habitat.

The best way to protect vernal ponds is to own the property. The next best way to protect them is to certify ponds with the Natural Heritage & Endangered Species Program.
