History of Spring Pond Woods Advocates

In 2008 word got out that the City of Salem changed its zoning ordinance amendment and a large parcel of land was to be developed for a Super Walmart and Lowe's Home Improvement. This area, known as Spring Ponds Woods or Camp Lion, loved for many generations by local people who had assumed that it was protected from development, organized a network of communications regarding public hearings. When the Salem Planning board met, citizens and local politicians who opposed the project were in attendance.

Many of us banded together and we discovered each of us had something different to offer in working towards our common goal

CAVPT members joined the Spring Pond Advocates to help out with vernal pool certification

of saving our local environment. A sub-group would conquer the field investigation, and so, attended an "Introduction to Vernal Ponds" and a Vernal Pool certification workshop presented by the Cape Ann Vernal Pond Team.

Starting on April 5, 2011, Katerina Panagiotakis, Leslie Courtemanche, Calvin Anderson and Rich Randall began the vernal pool explorations. We were able to observe and document the abundance of life including but not limited to, red spotted newts, fairy shrimp, diving beetles and chorus of wood frogs and spring peepers. We then submitted a Vernal Pool Observation Form to the Natural Heritage & Endangered Species Program.

5 Vernal pools are now certified. We were also able to observe and record various Species of Special Concern which can be used to delineate and protect Rare Species Habitat.

Shortly thereafter came the announcement the Lowe's was closing 20 stores in 15 states and the development project was not going forward.

We hope in the future, Spring Pond Advocates may become a 501(c)3 non-profit organization and gain many more members who are passionate about the environment.



Certification Report

2015 was another productive year for vernal pond certification. Data was collected from pools and will be submitted to the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) for certification. Thanks to Matt Burne for his expertise with the on-line certification process and Dan Wells for locating ownership of the land where pools were found. Colleen Anderson, Nick Taormina, Richard Roth, and Ben Alger, a student from Manchester Essex Regional High School's Green Team, did this year's fieldwork.

Pool certification is a time sensitive process in that viable amphibian egg masses, which are the most commonly used biologic evidence used to certify a pool, are only found for a short period of time in spring. If you are interested in protecting a pool please let us know so we can scout it in advance to be prepared for this window of opportunity. We are always looking for interested candidates to fill the ranks of our certification team. Turtle Trapping

The CAVPT conducted another Blanding's Turtle Survey in a freshwater swamp in West Gloucester in June of 2015. Traps were set, baited, and checked daily for a period of 21 days. Blanding's turtles *Emydoidea blandingii* are listed as Threatened under the Massachusetts Endangered Species

Act and there are on-going efforts to find and protect Blanding's habitat. There have been historic sightings of this reptile on Cape Ann. Although 2015's survey was unsuccessful in trapping this elusive solitary animal, additional potential habitat was scouted for future surveys. They have a dark body, a bright yellow throat, and can grow up to nine inches long. If a sighting

is made, photograph to confirm identification and notify the Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program.

FEATURED CREATURE

Marbled Salamander

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Ambystoma Opacum

SIZE: Adults: 11 cm (4 in) **LIFESPAN**: 8-10+ years

RANGE: Eastern United States: Southern New England to Florida

and as far west as Illinois and Texas.

DIET: Larvae take small aquatic animals (zooplankton), adults take terrestrial invertebrates, such as worms, insects, centipedes and mollusks (snails, slugs), larger individuals will take eggs and larvae of other amphibians.




DESCRIPTION:

- HABITAT: Damp woodlands, forests and places with soft, wet soil. They are secretive, spending most of their life under logs or in burrows.
- ABUNDANCE: Uncommon, not found on Cape Ann. A Threatened Species in Massachusetts.
- **BREEDING**: During the fall the adults migrate to dry vernal ponds. Eggs are laid singly in shallow depressions beneath surface materials. Females may brood eggs which usually hatch in fall or early winter when submerged.
- **SIMILAR SPECIES**: Other mole salamanders including spotted and blue spotted.
- **COMMENTS**: Has a stocky build, boldly banded. Female's bands tend to be grey while those of the male's are mostly white. Nocturnal, not poisonous like other salamanders.



The Need for Protection...

The temporary nature of vernal ponds often belies their importance. Countless plants and animals live in vernal ponds. Insects, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals visit to drink, feed, breed and nest. Some species, such as spotted salamanders, wood frogs and fairy shrimp are totally dependent on this habitat.

The best way to protect vernal ponds is to own

the property. The next best way to protect them is to certify ponds with the Natural Heritage & Endangered Species Program. Certification application reports include photographs, maps and field observation forms.
